You may have received an HEA scholarship. You may have benefited from an HEA workshop. Or you may know a colleague who is brimming with innovative ideas to support future teachers. This is your opportunity to serve Hawaii's educational community in a new way. The HEA is calling for nominations for board members. Nominate yourself or a fellow educator.

Board Nominations and Flections

This year, there are seven available positions. The deadline for nominations is March 8, 2024. If there is an election (more than the 7 available seats of nominations), ballots will be sent to HEA members around March 15, 2024. Proxies will be mailed at the same time even if there is no election. The election deadline is April 12, 2024.

If there is an election, the votes will be tabulated on Tuesday, April 16, 2024. According to election rules, candidates may send observers on this day. If there are fewer candidates than vacancies, those candidates will be automatically elected. Election results will be presented to the HEA Board of Directors for certification at the Annual Meeting on April 20, 2024. All candidates will be notified of the election results on or about May 1, 2024.

All ballots will be stored at the HEA office in a sealed container for thirty days after certification. Any challenge made to these procedures or to the conduct of the election must be made in writing, signed by the challenger, and forwarded to HEA within 30 days after certification.



RULES OF HEA ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING April 20, 2024

1. SEATING OF DELEGATES

- a. Persons certified as eligible to vote and/or eligible to cast certified proxy votes, shall be Registered by the Credentials Committee on the Roll Call Sheet with the total number of votes he/she can cast.
- b. Only certified members or persons with proxy vote(s) may be seated in the voting area. Visitors will be seated in a separate area.
- c. Voting members absenting themselves from the floor shall notify the Credentials Committee.

2. VOTING

- a. Only certified members and persons with certified proxies shall be allowed to vote.
- b. All voting shall be by a show of hands of those present and eligible to cast a vote. Any person may request a roll call vote. Persons voting shall not cast more votes than the number listed on the Roll Call Sheet.

3. DEBATE

- a. Only persons in the voting area will be recognized by the Chair.
- b. Except by a two-thirds' vote of certified members present, no speaker shall:
 - (1) have the floor continuously for more than two minutes; nor
 - (2) speak more than two times on the same subject.

This time limit shall not apply to a Chairperson making a presentation of his/her report.

RULES OF HEA ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING - Page 2

4. VISITORS

- a. The privilege of participating in discussion and debate shall be extended, at the discretion of the presiding officer, to any visitor at the annual meeting.
- b. Visitors who are permitted to speak shall conform to the provisions in Rule 3b.

5. PARLIAMENTARIAN

The presiding officer shall appoint a qualified person to act as parliamentarian for the meeting. The presiding officer may consult the parliamentarian on any point of order, but the presiding officer shall render all decisions on such points on his/her own responsibility. The presiding officer's decision shall be binding unless overruled by a majority vote.

6. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY AND GUIDE

The rules contained in *Robert's Rules of Order* (Newly Revised), shall govern the Meeting in all cases (except any elections) to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Bylaws or the special rules of order of this organization.

FY 2023-2024 PRESIDENT SUMMARY REPORT

This report has been difficult for me to write as it needs to include the reporting of the loss of one of Hawai'i's education icons: Joan Lee Husted. I am fortunate to have known her and worked with her, but as she has served as my professional and educational North Star for the bulk of my 35 year teaching career, I am missing her counsel greatly.

However, I think she would appreciate what we have accomplished this year which includes:

- Supporting educators and future educators: Our Centennial Scholarships live on in the development of the first Dive Into Education Convening for high school Education Pathway students. The brainchild of students in Pearl City High School's Tammy Yoon (a Centennial Scholarship recipient)'s Education Capstone Class, this event is a game changer for future educators in Hawai'i. Students from high schools across Oahu gathered at UH West Oahu for a morning of educational professional development, networking, and workshopping. In addition, this event brought together education community groups including UH, DOE, HSTA, HSTB, and tying it together, HEA. I was honored to be the keynote speaker for the day.
- Updating our association's documents: With the help of both our attorney, Brian Ezuka, and our Executive Director, Laurie Togami, HEA's Articles of Incorporation and ByLaws have been updated and amended as needed.
- Continuing our professional development offerings: HEA hosted a two day training on the use of AI and the Ethical Implications both for the education profession in general, and as they relate to student, staff and community use of AI. We were fortunate to have the expertise of both Fred Lane and Dr. Troy Hutchings for this shared good work. Joining them as panelists were students from both Pearl City High School and Chaminade University.

- Developing coursework for use in our classrooms and communities: Under the guidance
 of our Program Director, Lynn Hammonds, HEA has contracted Fred Lane to develop a
 multi credit professional development course on AI & Education. The course is being
 sponsored by Kapolei High School Principal, Wes Shinkawa, and we are hoping to start
 registration of our inaugural class soon.
- Networking with sibling organizations: HEA helped sponsor the Induction Ceremony for the Hawaii Board Certified Teacher Class of 2024 (Go Wood Dragons!). As HEA president, I was invited to serve as the emcee and was grateful to represent HEA as we were joined by both Governor Josh Green and Hawaii State Superintendent Keith Hayashi among other illustrious leaders.

Our work continues into the new year with a focus on managing, enhancing and growing our resources so that we can continue our shared good work. The most important resource we have, however, is our membership and specific focus will be on delivering for you.

We could not do this without our intrepid team. This includes our staff; Executive Director, Laurie Togami, our Membership Clerk, Normita Agustin, and our Program Manager, Lynn Hammonds. And it includes our board members; the late (great) Joan Husted, Pili Lee Loy, Wil Luna, Meredith Maeda, Jonathon Medeiros, June Motokawa, and Jacquie Yanagi. I would also like to thank Nathan Hokama who works with us on our communication strategies and products. His great work has helped us better articulate ours.

FY 2023-2024 Executive Director Summary Report

The following are the activities of the Association this past year:

- 1. The HEA Board of Directors re-elected Joan Lewis as its President, Joan Husted as its Vice President, and Wilbur Luna as its Treasurer. Upon Ms. Husted's passing on October 2, 2023, the board appointed Jonathon Medeiros as Vice President.
- 2. As of April 19, 2024 all contributions totaled \$27,450.33.

HEA Scholarship	4,900.00
Endowed Scholarship	5,609.18 (In Memory of Joan Husted - \$3,559.57)

- 3. As of April 19, 2024, the Advisor Capital Management (ACM) investment account balance was \$1,848,307.03 and the value of the Structured Notes was \$977,596.58.
- 4. As of March 31, 2024, the outstanding balance on the TriState Line of Credit loan is \$165,829.16. To date HEA paid \$159,070.84 towards the principal.
- 5. Educator Connection's next quarterly issue will be mailed in May 2024.
- 6. As of April 19, 2024, HEA gained 22 new members. However, the overall membership declined by 96 members to 1,898 due to the aging of our members and non-renewals.
- 7. TAAC grants at \$200 each were awarded to Farrington High, James B. Campbell High, Kauai High, Leilehua High, Maui High, and Mililani High schools.
- 8. The Hawaii State Legislature Grant In-Aid application was submitted in January 2024. The grant request was for \$50,000.
- 9. Mrs. Agustin has been posting and monitoring all social media accounts. She has been creating posts for HEA's Leadership Summit & Workshops, HEA's scholarships, and other HEA news.

- 10. HEA's 990-T Income Tax Return for FY 2021-22 was filed and accepted by the IRS in May 2023. The required fee and report to the Attorney General's Tax & Charities Division have been submitted.
- 11. In May 2023, Mr. Luna and Mrs. Togami participated in Leilehua's CTE award banquet program to present Aiden Galiza with his \$500 TAAC scholarship award as well as an additional \$500 grant to help cover his travel expenses to the National FCCLA conference in Denver, CO.
- 12. This year, HEA awarded Ryiane Pascua from Leilehua High \$500 to cover her travel expenses this summer to the National FCCLA conference in Seattle, Washington.
- 13. President Lewis, Dr. Hammonds, Nathan Hokama and Mrs. Togami attended the Pearl City High CTE Event at the University of Hawaii, West Oahu on November 3, 2023. President Lewis was the keynote speaker.
- 14. The Leadership Summit and Workshop was held at the Neil Blaisdell Center on December 8 & 9, 2023. Dr. Troy Hutchings and Frederick Lane presented on the Ethical Dimensions of Artificial Intelligence. HEA received media coverage from Civil Beat, HNN, KHON2, and KITV for the event. Follow-up AI Webinars were held January 30, February 13 and March 5, 2024 by Dr. Hutchings and Mr. Lane.
- 15. The amended and revised ByLaws and Articles of Incorporation were approved in December 2023 and submitted to DCCA.
- 16. HEA received \$489.56 from Issaquah Education Association (sister to Washington Education Association). The board accepted a motion to match Issaquah's donation of \$500. HEA also received \$2,779.66 from HEA members supporting Maui Fire victims. A poll was asked from HEA members to vote for which organization HEA should send the funds to. The top choice was Lahaina Public Schools. The board decided to evenly distribute \$3,800 (\$950 per school) to the following Lahaina public schools:
 - King Kamehameha III Elementary
 - Lahaina Intermediate
 - Lahainaluna High
 - Princess Nahienaena Elementary
- 17. Farmers Hawaii auto insurance premiums totaled \$3,082.38 in commissions as of April 19, 2024. HEA was informed that Farmers Hawaii will discontinue offering new automobile policies due to the claims inflation and increased costs associated with replacement parts and higher labor rates. They will continue to renew existing policies, however, HEA's contract will end on October 12, 2024 and we no longer will receive commissions.
- 18. HEA's Long Term Care Insurance Program with Continental Casualty Company and Ability Insurance is still being handled by LaBenz & Associates. There are 143 members enrolled in the Long Term Care Insurance program.
- 19. Forty-one (41) members are enrolled in the Protective Life cancer insurance program.

- 20. HEA continues to assist our affiliates.
 - a. Assists Oahu Retired Teachers Association (ORTA) with membership record-keeping, and publishing their semi-annual newsletter.
 - b. Assists the Hawaii State Educational Officers Association (HSEOA) with depositing their dues and forwarding membership dues to NEA on a monthly basis.
 - c. Provides clerical assistance to HSTA-Retired for their newsletter and scholarship.

Strategic Communication Solutions Hawaii Education Association Annual Report June 2023 – April 2024

The Hawaii Education Association (HEA) board of directors and leadership staff and met with Nathan Hokama of Strategic Communication Solutions at its annual business meeting in April 2023. HEA officially engaged Strategic Communication Solutions to provide member communications, media relations, and support for fund development communications in June 2023. The following is a recap of the type of activities that Strategic Communication Solutions has worked on over the past year:

June 2023

Communications Plan Development

Joan Lewis and Laurie Togami met with Nathan Hokama to discuss HEA's priorities and positioning in the community. One of the key concerns was the financial sustainability of the organization and minimizing the use of the corpus of HEA's endowment to cover the operating costs. HEA's primary goal was to raise its visibility in the community by showcasing how it was supporting educators in meaningful ways and demonstrate the need for financial support. Nathan Hokama drafted a communications plan to support HEA's goals and to serve as a guide on how HEA could be positioned within Hawaii's educational community and in the broader community.

Membership Appeal Letter for 2023 Academic year

Drafted an appeal letter for the academic year for distribution in June 2023. This letter was primarily targeted at HEA members.

Corporate Appeal Letter with Sponsorship Levels

Developed an appeal letter along with sponsorship levels targeting corporations and others outside of the education community. This approach was postponed, but the template for the structure of sponsor levels was used to solicit sponsors for the annual Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop on the ethical dimensions of generative technology (artificial intelligence) featuring keynote speakers Fred Lane and Troy Hutchings.

June-July 2023

Op-ed Commentary

Following the close of the 2023 legislative session, Nathan Hokama brought together Joan Lewis, Laurie Togami, and Debi Hartmann, associate executive director for the University of Hawaii Professional Assembly, to develop an op-ed commentary focusing on the need to make funding for the University of Hawaii system a priority and ensure quality programs would be available for Hawaii high school graduates. Increasingly, the UH has been the school of choice for many local families because of the rising cost of college tuition.

The op-ed, ghostwritten by Nathan Hokama and bylined by Joan Lewis and Joan Husted, was published in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser on July 27, 2023. It was a way to highlight the thought leadership of HEA and attract positive media attention. Rep. Amy Perusso, a former DOE teacher, was among those who sent positive comments to Joan Lewis, recognizing the value of the message in the commentary. Drafted an acknowledgement message to Rep. Amy Perusso from Joan Lewis.

July 2023

HEA Scholarship Recipients

News releases on HEA scholarship recipients (both students and educators) were separated geographically by island/county or neighborhood on Oahu and distributed to appropriate media outlets to generate awareness of HEA's contributions to the educational community.

July – August 2023

"Communities of Care" webinars

Met with Laurie Togami and Lynn Hammond to discuss Fred Lane's webinars and met with Troy Hutchings to discuss "Communities of Care" virtual sessions. Developed session descriptions to promote Troy Hutchings' sessions through flyers, web and newsletter articles, social media posts, and a news release. Provided feedback and recommendations to Troy Hutchings following first virtual session.

July - December 2023

Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop

Discuss community presentations outside of Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop with Fred Lane to determine how to develop sponsorship packages. Draft customized appeal letters to various sponsor organizations, including (private-sector companies, kupuna organizations, and higher education institutions to support the Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop.

Sponsor Prospect Outreach:

- Discussed HEA's sponsorship opportunities with Christine Diaz of Pacific Business News for potential Spectrum sponsorship. Spectrum agreed to be a sponsor, but HEA declined since we could not guarantee the number of attendees at the Leadership Summit or Educator Workshop.
- Reached out to University of Hawaii Professional Assembly (UHPA) President Christian Fern, who spoke with University of Hawaii CFO Kalbert Young about sponsorship. Kalbert Young recommended reaching out directly to UH President David Lassner. Fred Lane was prepared to talk about the use of artificial intelligence for underserved students at the college level.
- Set up meeting with Lynn Hammonds and Laurie Togami to discuss Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop with Christine Diaz and Lei Pedro of Pacific Business News. At the request of PBN, refined sponsorship packages for Leadership Summit and Educator Workshop to share with possible business sponsors.

TAAC's goal is to motivate and encourage high school students to pursue a career in teaching. The objectives of the program are:

- To provide grants to support the projects and activities of the TAAC clubs at participating schools.
- To encourage and support professional learning by convening an annual one-day symposium for TAAC advisors, in partnership with the HI DOE and local universities.
- To form a special HEA Committee to support efforts to promote teaching as a career and advocate for teaching as a profession.

Activities/Accomplishments in FY 2023-24:

- Awarded \$200 grants to CTE Pathway/TAAC clubs to Farrington High, James B. Campbell High, Kauai High, Leilehua High, Maui High, and Mililani High schools.
- Received \$500 TAAC Scholarship recipients from Mililani High and Maui High schools.
- HEA CTE Centennial \$5,000 Grant awarded to Tammy Yoon from Pearl City High was used for a CTE "Dive Into Education" 2023 Conference at the University of Hawaii West Oahu campus. More than 130 high school students from seven public schools gathered in November 2023.
